

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Milwaukee, Wisconsin - August 2019

The ADLA Los Angeles Chapter is 1 of 9 such chapters across the country. The Association serves as a collective "voice" for African Americans and those of African descent in the Caribbean who are Lutheran.

The Los Angeles Chapter seeks to improve our communities with direct assistance programs, promote the qualities of higher education through scholarships and support the Southwest California Synod and the ELCA with its special agency appeals.

MISSION IN ACTION

The 2019-year began by coordinating and hosting with the Southwest California Synod, its 39th Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemoration and Celebration Worship Service. This is the 5th year in which ADLA has facilitated this synod-wide worship event, which has over time become the 2nd highest attended synod annual event. Each year, the host sanctuary has been filled with the presence of our synod family (over 600 attendees) offering praises and thanks to God for the life of Dr. King, while recalling our respective responsibilities in "keeping the candle of justice lite".







A gift of \$1,109 was offered to ELCA Disaster Response from offerings received in recognition of the horrific fires in California and the unceasing floods in the mid-west. Here are other notable programs that have received financial support as a result of the annual MLK worship service over the years:

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Total distributed offerings to all recipients amounted to \$11,794.09.

Earlier in the Spring 2018, ADLA Los Angeles held its 4th Gala and Awards Dinner in recognition of those nominees whose "walk with Christ" serves as an example for others to follow and as a platform for raising funds in support of the ELCA Robinson-Conway Scholarship Fund. To date, ADLA Los Angeles has contributed a total of \$4,400 towards this scholarship, which seeks to aid qualified female seminarians pursue their graduate education, \$800 of that was dedicated to the equally important Daniel Payne Scholarship.







For many, just getting through the day, retrieving a meal and finding a place to sleep for the night is a demanding challenge. ADLA Los Angeles is also reminded of those among us who are without as it doubled its "God's Work, Our Hands" efforts in providing much needed hygiene products and other personal items to those persons residing on Skid Row, downtown Los Angeles. In keeping with the 500th Year of the Reformation, over 500 kits were assembled and distributed in 2017-18, half during Easter and the remainder as part of the September outreach.







Two hundred special women's hygiene packets were assembled and distributed in December 2018 following a "plea for dedicated aid" from women residing on the streets. Each kit cost \$11.50 (or \$8,050 for the total 2018 service distribution). Personal greetings and prayers are among the wishes we extended to the massive number of recipients in our receiving lines. Not surprisingly, a cold bottle of water was seen as a precious commodity. Pastors, catechism students, ADLA members and, just this year – members from The Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles via Union of Black Episcopalians (UBE), its H. Belfield Hannibal Chapter – joined in the distribution. Even with the presence of these faithful, we were reminded that: "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few". Matthew 9:37

For the last four Summers, ADLA Los Angeles has elected to host workshops on the subject of self-help in Christ. 'Grown Woman, Real Talk' is an annual gathering that affords women (ages 17 – 80+) the opportunity to express their personal concerns, having them addressed through scripture, facilitated by Arizona State Bishop, Rev. La'Tresa Jester, Full Gospel Fellowship International. Bishop Jester's presence helps ADLA Los Angeles honor its ecumenical relations with the Baptist Church. Workshop questions are raised and shared by the audience and the facilitator guides the group through scripture for the answers. The bible is the place for answers! Additionally, in 2018, we included suicide prevention as a topic of discussion, warranting its own workshop. This was an all day event with much reflection, contemplation, and prayer. The 2019 workshop reflected the continued interests and growth of the program.







Sometimes it is necessary to set some time aside for fellowship. Each Fall, usually in September, ADLA Los Angeles charters a 54 passenger bus for a trip to Veijas Casino and Resort. Yes, a few hours of financial intrigue and prospecting. While much fun and camaraderie occurs, the net proceeds are gifted to Hope Lutheran Church, Hollywood in direct support of its prison ministry. Resources are used to purchase "recovery bibles" for the incarcerated. To date, ADLA has raised \$1,250 for this expressed purpose. Additionally, ADLA members often attend the dedication worship service for the bibles that are placed into service. "The Word of God will never return to

ADLA Los Angeles continues to address both local and national chapter goals, having met with the Southern California Chapter of the National Black Presbyterian Caucus in 2018 while participating in the 2019 UBE 51st Annual Business Meeting [channels of communication and collaboration], collected and submitted 54 pounds of aluminum pull-tabs in support of The Ronald McDonald House, Long Beach [family support and services to chronically ill children], provided annual contributions to Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary and California Lutheran University [solidarity in mission], as well as its promotion of intra-worship service exchange among the metropolitan churches, providing ADLA Los Angeles the chance to support the individual worship sites of its members.

2020 Report to the SW California Synod - Synod Hunger Team

Domestic Hunger Grants - This year we had three organizations or churches in our synod apply for a Domestic Hunger Grant. The review process is complete and our review notes are on their way to the Hunger Office in Chicago. We have reviewed each grant and submitted our information through the Grantmaker syste. All grant reviews are due by September 14, 2020 and we are ahead of schedule. Each organization was an organization that I am proud to support and to know that they are in our synod. Grants should be announced late in 2020 and each grant is given for three years. If an organization does not receive the grant, they are invited to apply next year. Last year ELCA World Hunger gave over 600 grants.

Our team met by Zoom to review the grants, but our other work has come to more or less a standstill due to Covid-19. The synod assembly is usually one of our big events for the year. We know that the congregations in our Synod are stepping up to feed those who are hungry due to the pandemic and the resulting economy. Our prayers are with everyone affected by the virus, the recession and by racism. 2020 is a year that needs many prayers.

Our team continues to work and pray for a world where all are fed.

Lay Leadership Mission Team Report - 2020

At the last live Synod Council meeting in February 2020, Bishop Erwin and I discussed offering a learning series on Luther's treatise *The Freedom of a Christian* for the commemoration of its 500th anniversary. Bishop Erwin would locate speakers on the subject and he would be facilitator. Then the Covid 19 pandemic hit.

Although we were not able to offer this learning opportunity, on August 5, 2020 the Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), invited the church to read, study and reflect on The Freedom of a Christian. The treatise's text and a study guide is available on the ELCA Website at elca500.org.

We had also planned classes on understanding and resisting systemic racism. Although we cannot meet in person, Churchwide offers materials at www.elca.org/Resources/ such as Ethnic Specific and Multicultural Ministries; African Descent; Explanation of the Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent; American Indian and Alaska Native; Arab and Middle Eastern; Asian and Pacific Islander; European Descent Lutheran Association for Racial Justice; Cross Cultural Conversations; Race, Ethnicity and Culture; Freed in Christ, Race, Ethnicity, and Culture; and many more. Materials are also available from Women of the ELCA (www.womenoftheelca.org/resources) such as The Story of Peter and Cornelius; Historical timeline of Race Relations; How to have helpful conversations about race in the church; and Listening to the Third Slave.

Pastor Stephanie P. Jaeger, Pastor Joseph Castañeda Carrera, Tuhina Rasche, and Tyra Dennis offered *How Strategic and Authentic is our Diversity?* (hosted via Zoom). I mention this here because it was great conversation and the hosts should be commended for leading this.

The ELCA Anti-Racism Pledge

And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him (Colossians 3:17).

As church we are called to confess the sin of racism, condemn the ideology of white supremacy, and strive for racial justice and peace. Beyond statements and prayers, we are called to also act and respond to injustices. We invite you to commit to one or more of the actions below:

- 1. Sign the pledge found under https://www.elca.org/racial justice pledge?, "I commit to study, prayer and action to become an anti-racist individual in an anti-racist church," and share your participation on social media using #ELCA4justice.
- 2. Work to dismantle racial injustice by listening to voices, experiences and the expertise of people of color. Learn about the ELCA ethnic-specific associations and their strategies.
- 3. Learn the history of systemic racism in this country and the ways racism and white supremacy impact every aspect of our life together.
- 4. Join, support or attend your synod's anti-racism team or work with your synod leadership to start one in your congregation. Study the ELCA social statement "Freed in Christ: Race, Ethnicity, and Culture" and the "Explanation of the Declaration of the ELCA to People of African Descent."
- 5. Explore and use on "God's work. Our hands." Sunday the forthcoming ELCA Advocacy resources on a "Just Society Supporting the Health of All," which are focused on advancing

racially equitable public policies, and by engaging in ELCAvotes to encourage and ensure voting rights for all.

- 6. Start where you are by joining community organizations working for racial justice.
- 7. Reach out to build or deepen relationships with Historic Black Churches. Consider using the congregational resource "Understanding One Another," co-authored by the ELCA and the African Methodist Episcopal Church, or our Joint Statement of Mission with the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church as a way to get started.
- 8. Explore and use the anti-racism resources of our ecumenical partners through the A.C.T. Now to End Racism initiative of the National Council of Churches.

I have signed the pledge. I have read the books: *Dear Church A Love Letter from a Black Preacher to the Whitest Denomination in the by U.S.* Lenny Duncan and *White Fragility, Why is it so hard for White People to talk about racism* by Robin Diangilo. Both books have opened my eyes, and I recommend them for everyone to read.

With joy I share with you about the work of California Lutheran University who as member of the Network of Colleges and Universities of the ELCA equips graduates who are called and empowered to serve the neighbor so that all may flourish.

4,303 Cal Lutheran students learn at 5 different centers in California. We offer 20 undergraduate majors and 29 graduate programs of study. 53% of our undergraduate students are from underrepresented populations and one third are the first in their family to attend college. Our students come from 42 states, 49 countries, and represent a diversity of faiths and cultures. With a network of 30,000 alumni, students from our founding in 1959 until now have discovered their purpose and are transforming their community and the world.

Exciting ventures are on this way this summer.

A dedicated space in the Student Union for a **Black Student Union/Sister's Circle headquarters** is being built for students to raise awareness of and share the richness of black history, African culture, and current issues affecting the black community.

On July 25-29, Cal Lutheran will welcome high school students and adults from Regions One, Two, Three and Four at the <u>Western States Youth Gathering</u>. As the journey of faith comes with the challenge of the unknown, students will FOCUS on grace, fear, love and Jesus. "SHIFT", a one-day leadership event for youth from racially diverse congregations will be held on July 24 in advance of the gathering.

Two sessions of "Executive Skills for Church Leaders: Learning from the world of the MBA" are offered yearly so that church leaders from outdoor and social ministry settings, congregations, and clergy can apply concepts from management to the complex arena of ministry today. The next sessions are July 13-17 at Cal Lutheran (scholarships available) and January 11-15, 2021, at Spirit in the Desert Retreat Center, Arizona.

Opening this summer, the new <u>Swenson Science Center</u>, a three-story, 47,000-square-foot facility will more than double the amount of space dedicated to science featuring 12 labs for teaching biomechanics, organic synthesis, physiology and neuroscience, marine biology, cell and developmental genetics, exercise physiology ergometry, and nuclear magnetic resonance and 8 labs designated for faculty and student research.

The <u>Thriving Leadership Formation</u> program brings ELCA leaders together to cultivate skills and networks of trust, support, spiritual practice and accountability. Fueled with \$1million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc., this project helps pastors and church leaders throughout 14 Western States avoid burnout and thrive in their ministries.

The university has opened the new <u>School for Professional and Continuing Studies</u> which include the Bachelor's Degree for Professionals program, the Center for Nonprofit Leadership, and a new Center for Lifelong Learning. A Fifty and Better program for older adults has been launched to serve older adults who want to take non-credit classes for the joy of learning and social engagement.

Cal Lutheran is one of eight universities partnering with the state of California on a first-in-the-nation program to help students pay for college through public service, targeting pressing challenges in our region. The students selected as **AmeriCorps Fellows** will dedicate 25 hours a week for 22 weeks to serve as mentors and advisors for low-income and immigrant youth throughout Ventura County.

Launching in fall 2020, an **ethnic and race studies major** will help students build cultural competence and gain deeper understanding of communities of color in the U.S. Student's confidence in their own identities will be strengthened by validating the historical, artistic, and economic contributions of the groups with which they identify.

Synod Assemblies 2020

About the ELCA Foundation

As our faith matures and deepens, so does the way we support God's work in the world. The ELCA Foundation exists to sustain and grow our ministries by stewarding assets for all the related organizations of the ELCA.

Through our national network of 23 gift planners, the ELCA Foundation supports members of the ELCA in their call to live as faithful and generous people. Our gift planners work with congregational members to create life giving plans that ensure successful and lasting legacies are passed on to loved ones and treasured ministries. The Foundation also supports and strengthens ELCA congregations, synods and related entities with gift planning resources and investment management services.

Regional Gift Planners are available to help:

- Work with congregational leaders to identify important considerations, and execute an appropriate plan, to cultivate current and planned gifts
- Develop congregational gift acceptance policies to receive gifts well
- Meet with individual members to develop charitable gift giving plans
- Establish an investment account for endowments and other investable assets utilizing the Endowment Fund Pooled Trust (Fund A)

In 2019, the ELCA Foundation network generated over \$124.1 million in total gifts and investment assets. Of that, \$91.3 million are future planned gift commitments with over \$12m in future planned gifts directly benefitting individual ELCA Congregations. There were \$6.9 million in current gifts, including funded trusts, gift annuities and individual endowments, and \$25.9 million new assets invested in Fund A. Thank you for the opportunity to work in your synod and trusting your endowment dollars to the ELCA Foundation.

✓ Ministry Highlights:

- CCLM Construction of a new roof at the shelter is ready to begin, as is the replacement of a sprinkler system. We are waiting for permits from the city of San Bernardino. In addition, the residential house that burned has been totally renovated and clients have moved back into the structure. The external painting of the residential houses is the only significant work that is outstanding. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of shelter clients was reduced for social distancing, but case management continues. Many of our community programs have been suspended but others, like our after-school sessions, are being offered digitally.
- Orange County has reduced the number of days our Garden Grove office is open, along with fewer numbers of hours per day. However, clients are still being case managed and assisted in other ways. This location deals with two groups of people. First, women who have been victims of crime and/or domestic abuse. Our Victims Intervention Program (VIP) offers both tangible and intangible supportive services, ranging from therapy to emergency housing to remove the client from an abusive partner. Second, we deal with those who are homeless and require immediate intervention. Funds from the Matthew 25 Grant program have been a godsend both to the Garden Grove office and the women, men and children who come there for hope.
- Riverside County Our Riverside County office is experiencing a significant surge from those in need of emergency services and rental assistance. The most vulnerable population consists of first-time clients that were secure in their homes prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. Calls are up by more than 120%, with many of our referrals coming from the resource line 2-1-1, churches, county and city agencies. Our emergency rental assistance program has assisted 28 families with housing and another 14 are waiting for paperwork to be processed. Most have either no source or significantly reduced income. Because most of these individuals are uncertain about their future employment, the challenge has been goal planning with them. Our goal is to continue to walk alongside them while they rebuild their resources and determine next steps.
- Rural San Bernardino County Our Behavioral Health providers have transitioned 98% of their therapeutic
 clients to remote and telehealth services. In Trona, a growing need for client confidentiality and safe
 expression has prompted the reopening of our physical office to allow much needed counseling sessions
 without the distraction or interruption of household residents.
- San Diego County has seen a significant surge in clients at our Project Hand food pantry in Chula Vista, nearly tripling previous monthly averages. In-kind donations of non-perishable food and gift cards are always welcome. The LSS Upward Bound/TRIO team has pivoted to remote services, in order to keep those students, already impacted by racial disparities, from falling further behind because of technological disproportions. The Kathy Hopper Senior Friendship Center in Clairemont Mesa is closed because of the pandemic, and the Senior Companion is making wellness contacts by telephone.

We are grateful to the Synod and all the congregations for your prayers and your many levels of support. At this time, when many services for the poor and disenfranchised are being reduced, your faithful commitment to our agency allows us to continue reaching those in greatest need. Thank you, and God bless you.



The Mission Investment Fund (MIF) is the lending ministry of the ELCA. MIF makes low-interest loans to ELCA congregations and ELCA-related ministries for building and renovation projects. With MIF loans, congregations and ministries can purchase property, construct new buildings, and expand or renovate existing facilities.

MIF loans expand the capacity for ministry. MIF loans help create expanded worship spaces, updated space for education and youth ministry, new kitchens for community meals, affordable housing units and much more.

At year-end 2019, MIF had 898 loans outstanding, totaling \$575.1 million.

To fund these loans, MIF offers a portfolio of investments for congregations, their members, synods and ELCA-related ministries to purchase. At year-end 2019, MIF investment obligations totaled \$493.4 million.

MIF is a financially strong and stable organization, with a record of steady, controlled growth. With total assets of \$712.3 million and net assets of \$211.9 million at year-end 2019, MIF maintains a capital ratio of 29.75 percent—positioning MIF in the top tier of well-capitalized church extension funds. 

MISSION TEAM FOR JUSTICE REPORT TO SYNOD - 2020

The Justice Team continued to meet most months through Tuesday, March 10, 2020 at the Synod Office. We heard reports from several of our committees or task forces. In February The Rev. Dr. Alexia Salvatierra and Dixie Hansen reported on the circles of care formed to help immigrant youth who are waiting for a court date on their asylum cases and are aging out of the foster care system. If they do not find a home and sponsor, they will be placed in adult detention. They are given a place to stay in someone's home for a limited time, and are helped to find employment. Dixie has been driving a young woman and her 4-month-old infant to a specialist in Orange County. Circles have been formed in several areas of our synod. Contact Alexia if you would like to help. There is a great need for gift cards to help feed and care for these young people. Gift cards can be sent to the Synod Office and labeled for Pastor Alexia.

The Green Faith group planned an event open to everyone for World Water Day, on Sunday, March 22, 2020, 4:00 at the L.A. River, McAdams Park. There was to be worship and the speaker was to be Dr. Cynthia Moe-Lobeda. It had to be cancelled due to the pandemic. Green Faith is proposing a ban on single use plastics.

The Anti-racism and Diversity Committee urged everyone to send comments to the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Department in Washington DC regarding the proposed new rule that would weaken oversight and national data on fair housing initiatives in low-income communities of color. Comments were to be sent by March 16. The new 'fair housing' rule absurdly ignores race, segregation, and housing discrimination, and incorrectly equates increased housing supply with fair housing choice.

Our Middle East Peace Task Force is considering a name change which would better label their work on Israel and Palestine rather than all of the Middle East. They have read and discussed *The Lemon Tree* by Sandy Tolan. They were planning an event with this author as speaker, but it had to be postponed. Their new book is a graphic novel titled *Footnotes in Gaza*.

Lutheran Office of Public Policy-CA (LOPP-CA) held a fundraiser at Ascension Lutheran, Thousand Oaks on Saturday, January 25, 2020. The speaker was former U.S. Representative Lois Capps on the topic "Faith and Politics." Thank you to Dixie Hanson and Jayne Affonso for preparing the wonderful brunch food, and thank you to our silent auction providers and bidders. The John August Swanson prints were very popular with the attendees. Director Regina Banks of LOPP-CA welcomed everyone and told a bit about our work in Sacramento.

The Justice Team is working very hard. Everyone is invited to receive our emails on justice issues. Beginning on September 8, 2020 our monthly meeting will be on Zoom. Just contact me and give me your email address if you wish to join.

Women of the ELCA Southwest Synodical Organization - 2019-2020

Autumn Renewal: On the weekend of October 12-13 the Women of the ELCA (WELCA) held our biannual Autumn Renewal at Cal Lutheran University. The theme was "Sharing God's Love through Gratitude" using 2 Corinthians 4:15:

"Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God."

This was a one night event instead of previous autumn renewals of two nights. Participants in the program included Pastors Jennifer Burgos, Marta Salazar and Tracy Williams leading devotions and worship; Keia Morris as Bible Study leader; Dona Kintzi and Sharon Heck leading music; and Corinne DeVries as vocal entertainment on Friday evening. We especially welcomed our Latina sisters and supported them with Spanish speaking leadership. In carrying out the theme of the event we had gratitude moments throughout as speakers lifted up the activities and causes they are grateful for in their lives and gratitude booklets for each participant to use to daily record their blessings. Our personal renewal activities included both meditative (labyrinth, yoga, nature walk) and creative (rock painting, beading, knitting and creating flowers) activities. We also included the movie "A Question of Faith" followed by discussion. Our offering of \$1346 was divided between Churchwide WELCA general budget and supporting the Triennial Convention delegates which was scheduled for July of 2020.

Conference of Presidents: As president of the Southwest Synod Women of the ELCA, I attended the Conference of Presidents meeting February 21-23, 2020 in Chicago at the Lutheran Center. I was on the planning committee for this meeting which met under the theme "The Power of Community." Questions from the God's work. Our hands. deck of cards handed out at the last Synod Assembly were used to facilitate discussion among participants at the Conference to discuss building community. Our mission statement begins with the phrase, "As a community of women created in the image of God, called to discipleship and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we commit ourselves" so it was appropriate to explore the power of that community. These annual meetings at churchwide are an opportunity to connect with other presidents around the country as we are inspired by our national leaders to share ideas for synod and unit renewal, for service and for ways to build community wherever we are.

Winter Gathering: We met on March 7 at Olivet Lutheran/Hawthorne with the theme "Hope in Difficult Times." 86 women attended the event which included devotions by Pastor Johnel Barron who is interim pastor at Olivet, a brunch and three speakers:

Shannon Savage-Howie, a Deacon and Spiritual advisor, who told about using "storytelling" to help those in the California Lutheran University and Conejo Valley communities who were impacted by the tragedy of both the Borderline shooting and the fires that devastated so many homes in the Thousand Oaks area to process their grief.

Raquel Bautista, a volunteer Social Worker in the Latino community, who told of her family experiences, her move from Mexico to California which led her to get her HS Diploma and her

participation in LA County Department of Mental Health. She teaches Art Classes that help empower Latina women in dealing with their problems. Outside in the courtyard she had a display of art and jewelry that had been made in her classes.

Lynn Bulock, a Deacon and writer, who found she was in a unique place with her writing gift to aid our synod in obtaining grants. She partnered with the mental health ministry program NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) and wrote a grant for Family and Friends. In her work with NAMI she has learned how to communicate with people who are confronting mental illness. The research shows that one in five of us are dealing with problems due to mental illness. It is often our faith that offers the hope they are seeking.

Dianne Tillman and Sharon Heck led the music. Our offering of \$1530 was divided between Lutheran Social Services/Long Beach, "My Friend's House" (a local food pantry) and the Churchwide Women of the ELCA.

Triennial Convention & Gathering: The Triennial Convention and Gathering planned for July 16-19, 2020 in Phoenix, Arizona with the theme "Just Love" has been postponed to August of 2021 due to Covid-19.

What's News: We published our newsletter *What's News* in April, "Creativity & Inspiration," with each board member sharing how they were coping with the sheltering in place due to Covid-19. Our July edition of the newsletter, "We Cn Do It," celebrated the 50th anniversary of the ordination of women with reflections on this theme from some of our synod women pastors.

Our synodical newsletter "What's News" is published quarterly and highlights the events of the synodical women as well as those of clusters and congregational units. There is also a regular column by Sharon Heck on Peace and Justice. Thanks to Maxine Cameron Stenstrom, editor and graphic designer, Karil Drake point person editor and Julie Jensen, Database Manager for facilitating this publication.
