he Churchwide W/ELCA Executive Board has launched a year-long million dollar campaign for Katie's Fund, beginning August 1, 2022 to July 31, 2023. Katie's Fund was begun as an endowment fund in 1997 with gifts given in thanks for the first ten years of Women of the ELCA ministries. Individuals, congregational units and synodical women's organizations have given to Katie's Fund.

The Fund supports Women of the ELCA ministries of global sharing, leadership development and living theology. To date, interest earned by the fund has provided leadership opportunities for young women at triennial gatherings and global networking on behalf of the organization. It has also supported our participation in ELCA National Youth Gatherings and human trafficking advocacy training.

Your gifts to Katie's Fund ensure the organization's continued commitment to community, growth, and action. Gifts to current fund needs and interest earned on gifts to the endowment are available for ministries in three key areas.

Gather Bible Study by the Rev. Sarah Olson-Smith

ather Magazine is featuring A new three-part Bible study series starting this month entitled 'Jesus and Nature. The monthly topics - trees, the soil and the creatures - will offer us new perspectives on the character of God and challenge us to deepen our stewardship of God's precious creation.

September 2022, Session 1: "Trees," will tap into Biblical images of trees and explore why planting and protecting trees is important, while rooting us in models of interdependence and mutuality.

id you know that 270 million+ persons are facing extreme hunger – up from 135 million before the pandemic? Did you know that one in six kids are at risk of hunger in the U.S.? Did you know that 26% of Black and Latino families struggle

feeding their children? I found the above facts on the Bread for the World (BFW) website. BFW is a grassroots Christian organization dedicated to ending hunger in the U.S. and the world, through advocating with our elected officials. Here is another quotation from their website: "As Christians we are called to seek justice, care for those experiencing hunger and poverty, and embrace our Creator's vision of hope, love, and peace. We are called to embody it in public as we com-

mit to live in solidarity with those who are made vulnerable by the inequities that drive hunger and poverty in the United State and around the world." Speak out for the rights of all who are destitute. Defend the rights of the poor and needy." (Proverbs 31:8-9)

An Offering of Letters is planned by BFW each year. Individuals and groups are encouraged to write letters to their elected officials on bills which will ease hunger. Over the years, these letters and emails from congre-

gations, campuses, and community groups have helped inspire our leaders in Washington, D.C., to pass legislative victories that reduce hunger in the U.S. and around the world.

Here are three reasons why churches should organize


an Offering of Letters:

THE ECHO PARK LAKE



cho Park lake was originally built in the 1860s as a reservoir for drinking water. Today Echo Park Lake is a Los Angeles icon that functions primarily as a basin in the City's storm drain system. Once maligned, neglected and wrought with pollution, efforts to restore and rehabilitate the Echo Park Lake have transformed the area from a community blight into one of most enjoyable destinations in the entire city, as well as a proud neighborhood landmark. Key features include fishing, pedal boats, a picnic area

and boat house. A one-mile walking path that loops around the lake is the perfect place to enjoy the natural haven that includes expansive lotus flower beds, wild geese and swans, and lush foliage. The lake's annual Lotus Festival Celebration stems from the original batch of lotus imported from China in the 1920s by Aimee Semple McPherson whose Angeles Temple still exists near the lake.
